


Breakdown of 2018 Senate races



States with U.S. Senate seats up for election







Bob Corker (R-TN)

- Senator Corker has been an outspoken critic of President Trump
- Rep. Marsha Blackburn (R-TN) announced her candidacy
- Former Democratic TN governor Phil Bredesen (2003-2011) also announced his candidacy




Thad Cochran (R-MS)

- Cochran, 80, chairs the Appropriations Committee and has been absent from the Senate for long stretches over the past year
- His resignation means both of Mississippi's Senate seats will be on the ballot come November



Orrin Hatch (R-UT)

- Senator Hatch announced his retirement after initially deciding to run
- Former MA governor and presidential candidate Mitt Romney announced he was running for the open seat in mid-February





Jeff Flake (R-AZ)

- Senator Flake decided not to run in light of low polling numbers and a strong challenge by State Rep. Kelli Ward
- Competitive Republican primary between Rep. Martha McSally (R-AZo2), Kelli Ward and former sheriff Joe Arpaio
- Rep. Kyrsten Sinema (D-AZo9) is considered the Democratic frontrunner




